

#### FAREWELL TO DR HARMER

I have had the fortune to work with Dr Harmer for 36 years. When I started at Edenvale High School, Dr Harmer was Mr Harmer and the Guidance and Physical Education teacher, and Guidance Counsellor. My most vivid memory of this time is of the shenanigans that happened regularly. I clearly remember the many occasions that gym equipment was sent on journeys around the school to various teachers' classrooms for no reason, the teacups stuck with Prestick to the saucers in the staffroom, and many other mischievous happenings. I wonder how many memos and warnings the Dr Harmer of today would have given the Mr Harmer of then?

I watched the development of Dr Harmer from teacher, to Head of Department Guidance, to Deputy Principal and Principal in 2005. At each level, I was in awe at how seamlessly he moved into each role and grew with such confidence. In all that has happened, I have noted how Dr Harmer has always had the interest of Edenvale High School as his first priority. Nothing has ever been done if it was not for the good of the school. On many occasions when we have been discussing and making decisions, he has always asked "What is best for Edenvale High School?"

One facet that I feel Dr Harmer has always focused on has been discipline. I still have images of the then Mr Harmer chasing learners around the old gym (now D block) and T block classrooms in order to catch smokers. Maybe some of you sitting here tonight were the ones being chased! There were times when Dr Harmer as HOD and Deputy Principal was single-handedly running the discipline, as he did not have the support from other staff at that time. But he never gave up and today I believe that is one of our single greatest strengths. He still feels as strongly today as he did then that discipline is of utmost importance. I believe that if we can take this lesson and continue, we will be just fine.

Dr Harmer has always found importance in the extra-curricular programme of the school. I have watched him coach rugby, waterpolo and athletics. No matter what he was doing, the activities excelled under his coaching and guidance. Teams won; the waterpolo players were selected for Gauteng teams, and he got us to the A league athletics at a time when the competition was at its highest against the top schools. His most recent sporting involvement was always to coach the U 14 girls relay side, which always medaled at the Prestige athletic meeting. He has always supported the cultural activities and even participated in few Major Productions!

When Dr Harmer took over the Principal post from Mr Gunther, he referred to it as a relay race and that he was picking up the baton and entering the next phase of the race. For Dr Harmer, this has been a sprint, with him always full of energy and enthusiasm and keeping his staff and the Governing Body on their toes for the next new idea. And as we all know, Dr Harmer wanted any new idea done yesterday. This enthusiasm has seen much development take place at Edenvale High School, starting with the purchase of the VW combi as the first school vehicle. We now have a fleet of vehicles, having saved much in bus costs. Then came the pavilion, the astro, the Lifestyle and Crossfit Centre and, most recently, the indoor swimming pool. Once again, all this has been done with the best interest of the school at heart.

Dr Harmer has always loved his sport. When I first knew him, he was involved in biathlon, triathlon and road running, and he completed his 10th Comrades marathon in 2008. Then, all of sudden, he hit on the idea of a mountain bike and was taking on adventure races of 60, 120 and 250 kms, and we know how more recently his love of crossfit has developed. Dr Harmer- you keep us amazed; what will it be next?

My late fiancé and I developed a friendship with the Harmer family, spending many holidays and time together. It was on these holidays that I saw another side to Dr Harmer: he absolutely loves sea fishing. From having seen a busy man at school who never stops, I was amazed that he could stand for hours on end fishing. The two facets just seemed so contradictory to me; however, it is Dr Harmer's ultimate way of rest and relaxation. He was there again recently in April and July and still catching many fish.

It was also through this friendship that I had the privilege to watch Devin grow up into the remarkable, kind gentle man that he is today. I was able to witness this at close quarters during his years at Edenvale High School. Devin was a phenomenal academic, athlete, swimmer, waterpolo player and rugby player, until an injury put a stop to that. His school career culminated in him leading the school as Head Boy in 2007 and being awarded a white blazer for his achievements, all this time with the continued support of Julia.



Dr Harmer apparently spent more than the normal four years obtaining his teaching diploma, probably only finishing it with the help of Julia. I am not sure if it was this or something else that suddenly drove him to continue with his studies in 1988, and he went on to complete his B.Ed., Masters and Doctorate degrees. Maybe he just wanted to use his long leave, which is no longera privilege, but I remember him taking time off to write his Masters. Once again, this just showed me his ability to drive himself and achieve the best that he can.

Dr Harmer has a subtle sense of humour, and some staff still do not know if he is serious or joking. This sense of humour has started our mornings on a lighthearted note and given us motivation for the day. Many feared the red hat! There is one situation that I can think of when I could have awarded the red hat to Dr Harmer. We were at an outside assembly– where the astro is now – and there was a boy misbehaving and Dr Harmer yelled "Come here, you with the white shirt!"

In June 2015, the Harmer family were involved in an awful car accident. Dr Harmer suffered a severe neck injury and some further complications. It was a huge shock to the school community and he was booked off from school for a term. In true Dr Harmer style, he was determined to be back as soon as he could and returned in September. Many of you may not know that is why there is a recliner chair in his office – so that he can rest. Well, it was never used for that. What many of you may also not know is that he suffered neurological damage in that accident, and has been in pain every day since then, but has never shown this. He has been an amazing example of how to overcome an obstacle. Many at the time thought that this would lead to his early retirement. Thank you, Dr Harmer, for your fighting spirit and for continuing to lead us through all the years.

When Dr Harmer took over the baton from Mr Gunther, he embarked on the journey from "Good to Great", to develop the school in accordance with the vision and mission statement, in order to take us literally on a journey to become the best that we can be. I truly believe that we all embarked on this journey with Dr Harmer and we have seen this development, and some remarkable achievements, over the years, in all aspects, over the years. As he has said: "We do not know how good we can be".

On a personal note, I have much to thank you for, Dr Harmer. You have always seen the good in me and pushed me to achieve the best that I could. You have shown me tremendous support and guidance, and I have learnt a tremendous amount from you. Thank you for all your professional advice.

I know that many staff and pupils have gained immeasurably from the wealth of experience you possess and the direction that you have given them. You have left an incredible impression and impact on the lives of so many. Even the development of our learnership teachers, many of whom are past pupils, has been enormous.

Dr Harmer has dedicated an enormous amount of his time to Edenvale High School. We cannot thank him enough for his dedication, passion, drive and total commitment. Dr Harmer, we thank you and salute you.

I never thought that this time would come but as it has been said "Without change, there would be no butterflies". Dr Harmer has always seen change as opportunity, and we need to look forward with positivity. Dr Harmer, you have left us in good hands

May you be blessed with good health, contentment and much happiness as you enter your retirement years. I am not going to say "slow down", as this is not in your nature, but I am going to say that now you will have more time to do what you love.

### **ARRANGEMENTS FOR 2023**

- Wednesday 11 January: pupils to be at school at 07h45. Register class lists will be posted onto the communicator on 10 January, to indicate your child's register class and venue.
- Times for 2023: Term 1 School will close at 14h00 on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday and at 13h20 on Thursday.
- Mathematics / Mathematical Literacy test for Grade 8 -12 will be written on 16 January 2023. This is compulsory for all learners. Learners who are absent must produce a doctor's note; otherwise they will receive zero.
- Block-testing period will be from 17 27 February.
- All learners will write a Mathematics / Mathematical Literacy assessment on 24 March 2023. This is compulsory for all learners. Learners who are absent must produce a doctor's note, otherwise they will receive zero.
- Please take note that it is the school's practice to schedule a Formal Assessment Task on the last day of every term. Do not make arrangements for an early departure for your holiday. This will not be accepted as a valid reason to miss the assessment and your child will be awarded zero, thus compromising his/her School-Based Assessment mark.
- Please note that all parents need to download the d6 communicator. This is the school's means of contact for all information. Note that the office will not print exam timetables and absentee note templates for learners.
- Please note, if you need to correct any information pertaining to change of address, contact number or email address, please send this information to Mrs Enell; jenell@edenvalehigh.co.za. The school works from one main central database. Any updates done to details linked to your d6 does not carry through to SMART. The school must be contacted directly.
- Parents may not drop off lunch, projects or items left at home at the front office. The admin staff are unable to collect and distribute these for learners. Learners must take responsibility for any item left at home.
- If a learner is feeling ill, he/she must see Mrs van der Ryst in G9 before contacting his/her parents a detention will be given if this process is not followed.
- No learner is allowed to have a cell phone in his/her possession during school hours. If seen, the phone will be removed and will have to be collected by a parent.
- Note that learners caught with a vape in their possession will receive 5 demerits. Learners caught smoking the vape will receive 20 demerits and a two day suspension. In both cases the vape will be confiscated for three months and may only be collected by a parent.
